HIGH -RISE APARTMENTS STILL A LONG WAY OFF

Despite weekly applications by Despite weekly applications by developers, Council will not consider re-zoning for high-rise until a socialogical and economic study has been concluded to decide the need and desirability of such projects within the municipality.

Such a study has become the task of Burnaty's new planuer Anthony Parr, who feels it will take about ten months. Under pressure from Council, however, he agreed to make a faster but less thorough appraisal of the local situation which would decide: does Burnaby want high-rise; will high rise buildings make Burnaby unattractive; and what effect will high-rise apartments have on the community!
