Emmott Regrets Moody RampRow

A dispute between Port Moody and Burnaby councils over a slope angle mistake inbulliding the Port Moody boat launching ramp has slimmered down after a statement by Reeve Alan Emmoth that "the verbal battle which has arisen over the situation is most regretable."

Port Moody Mayor Al Howe has suggested a new ramp, with a steeper slope, be constructed adjacent to the existing one, which has only a 7.8% grade against the Boating Association's recom-mended 20% grade,

Burnaby Councillors Doug Drummond and Emmett Cafferky made remarks about the ramp which Reeve Emmott considered "quite unnecessary,"

"I was also unhappy to see statements which issued from Port Moody aldermen," said the reeve. "If there has been an error made at the ramp, I am sure it is not serious and that it will be corrected."

Burnaby and Fort Moody are half-partners in building the facility, at a cost of \$50,000 in all. The facility was designed to serve residents of both Burnaby and Port Moody.


