freeze on new home building applications on oversize lots pending a public hearing.

The freeze, which went into effect May 17, affects lots designated R1a, R2a, R3a, R4a, R5a and R9a. In the meantime, the

planning department is drafting a new bylaw which

within two months, according to Ald. Derek Corrigan.

The present formula for oversize lots regulates new home size according to a ratio of building to land with some flexibility allowed for special applications.

But council discovered that under that bylaw, too

many new residential applications - 47.5 per cent qualified for larger homes.

"These lots we are referring to are huge," Ald. Egon Nikolai said, "so if you put a house on them according to the formula, the houses are enormous."

"What's been happen-Corrigan said,

that people will tear down an old house on one of the Ra lots and up a huge dwelling on a block of small houses.

The new formula, recommended by the planning department, would keep new houses built on Ra lots more in line with surrounding neighborhoods.

applications filed

will be assessed under the old formula. However, no new applications will be accepted until the public hearing is held and a new bylaw is in place.

Edmonds area residents got what they came for last week, as council agreed to an immediate review of the proposed Edmonds Station

The "triangle" includes four highrise sites bounded by Beresford on the north. Edmonds on the south, and Griffith and Nineteenth on the west. The remaining six sites are on the south side of

"I'm happy because it got

the ball rolling again Craig T. Wilson, founder of the Edmonds Citizen Coalition. "When one-third of the people who live in the area turn up at a council meeting, they have to listen.'

Wilson appeared before council last July to request a review of the plan, but was turned down.

The coalition wants the proposed 29 highrises for the area reduced to 19 highrises with the remaining 10 sites downgraded to allow lowrise development.

"We are adamantly opposed to 29, highrises in the ed to 29, nightises in the neighborhood that right now has none," Wilson said. "Asking them to downsize from 29 to 19 isn't asking much. We want anything but (highrises)."

Wilson said the proposed zoning for the area is "all wrong." "Highrises should wrong. "Fingrises should be built at the top of the hill with lower buildings on the slope, he said. "We have a beautiful view. Everyone has south exposure. I can see the San Juan Islands. If they go through with the present plan we'd be surrounded by concrete."

1892, is the oldest in Burnaby. "It's very run down, naby. It's very run down, with open ditches, poor lighting, and no sidewalks," Wilson said. "The sidewalks were paid for 11 years ago and we're still waiting for

Wilson said the group hopes the area is developed as quickly as possible.

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
